Our new Power Pole Pruner has helped us to make real progress in our tidy up campaign. After the prolonged spell of bad weather stopped us working, we began to think the bird nesting season would be upon us before we could do anything about removing the small trees growing at the water's edge alongside the towpath. However a beautiful spring like day on the on 24th Feb. drew out the troops. We are making excellent progress. It's amazing how a machine can make such a difference. Lying on your stomach, with you nose almost in the water whilst surrounded by the sweet aroma of dog poo, as you try to cut an un-cooperative branch with a bow saw, is not our idea of fun anymore. The large tree that had fallen across the canal at Harlaxton has been removed as has the second one that fell, near Vincent's Bridge, during the recent high winds. 5. Chairman's observations

I attach a fact sheet showing comparisons between National Trust, RSPB and British Waterways income sources and a few other facts

BW, in their quest to become a charity, have made comparisons with NT and specifically state that as a charity they will open new funding streams – legacies, grants, etc..

This is correct but BW only paints one half of the picture.

Both NT and RSPB (and other like bodies) are membership organisations of long standing. Both have invested heavily in individual supporter contact over many years and have gained the trust of their members. Members feel they have, and to a certain extent are correct, a say, in the policies and running of the charity.

For BW to achieve their aspirations they will need to invest in fund-raising teams and develop a marketing structure that focuses on individuals. Nowhere has this been mentioned in their plans to date.

To receive significant legacy income BW management will need work hard to gain the confidence of their supporters and 'value' individuals.

Unlike NT or RSPB where access is free only to members (everyone else pays) currently BW properties are open to all. It may prove difficult to encourage benefactors that any gifts will be used appropriately within, what is perceived to be, a national asset – charity or not – unless BW establish close supporter links. Under the current structure (and management) this may be hard to achieve.

The BW's negative attitude to volunteers is slowly changing, at least publically, but management appear unable to recognise that the skills volunteers bring can fulfil a complete cross-section of an organisation structure and are not just limited to low-level litter-pickers. Furthermore BW must not be permitted to use its authority to reduce the role of voluntary society activity in order to strengthen its own volunteer base.

I hope this helps your understanding of the problems facing a change of this magnitude.

6. Volunteer Vacancies - Grantham Canal Partnership

The GCP is the 'umbrella' organisation responsible for promoting and coordinating the restoration of the Grantham Canal. Its membership consists of British Waterways, the six local authorities through which the canal flows, Natural England, the Inland Waterways Association and the Grantham Canal Society. The GCP is chaired by Michael Rowen and its Executive meets quarterly.

The GCP currently has two important Volunteer Vacancies:

Meeting / Minutes Secretary

to assist the Honorary Secretary, Peter Stone, with the arranging of the Executive's meetings and recording of them. The role is interesting rather than onerous - but does call for a tidy mind and basic administrative (IT) capabilities.

Heritage Boat Restorers

70-foot narrowboat 'Corvus' was built as a butty in 1935 by Yarwoods of Northwich for the Grand Union Canal Carrying Company. She was rebuilt in the mid-1980s by British Waterways as a powered maintenance vessel and operated in the East Midlands until 2006.

She is currently on dry land at Woolsthorpe Depot and in urgent need of conservation, leading to restoration and possible conversion.

Volunteers are required to form a team to undertake this work - and also for someone to take responsibility for it Previous experience would be a great help but is not essential. This is a rare opportunity to join or lead a heritage boat project 'from scratch'.
