1. The A46 Road Improvements

2. Heritage Lottery Application

The Grantham Canal Partnership supported by the Grantham Canal Society has submitted an application to the Heritage Lottery Fund (HLF) to restore locks 14 and 15. The emphasis of the bid is to undertake the lock restoration using volunteers as part of a national waterway skill training initiative being developed by the Inland Waterway's Association, with an emphasis on learning waterway heritage construction skills.

Although we are only applying for funding for the restoration of only two of the four locks which remain derelict on the Woolsthorpe flight, we are confident that the skills learnt will enable the remaining two locks and indeed other derelict locks elsewhere on the Grantham Canal to be restored. As this is part of a national training initiative we will also, through skills learnt, be indirectly assisting in the restoration of locks on other remainder waterway canals.

In addition to the restoration of the locks, we are also proposing to work with local canalside village communities to research and install bespoke interpretation panels and new signage along the full 33 mile of the canal. It is hoped that this locally based research will discover previously unseen photographs of the canal before it closed and unlock lots of canal memories which can be recorded.

A further emphasis will be the marketing of the many volunteering opportunities on the canal to attract a much wider cross section of people than is currently the case.

It is a long process; our submitted application is only the first step to allow us to commission a series of studies and reports to enable us to submit a HLF stage 2 application. We will hear if we have been successful for our Stage 1 Application in early June and we aim to submit our stage 2 application in August 2012.

The value of the stage 1 application is £55,000, with the estimated overall cost of the proposed works (stage 2) being £750,000. Out application to the HLF would be for £380,000, with the remaining costs being secured through other grant funding bodies, company sponsorship and 'gift in kind', which will primarily consist of the value of volunteers who are involved with the project or are receiving training.

If we are successful then it will give the Grantham Canal and its canal heritage a much needed boost. Restoration of these locks would be the next step in achieving navigation into Leicestershire and eventually through to Redmile. Undoubtedly there will be plenty to do but it will be worth it! In the meantime we must keep our fingers crossed and hope we are successful with the stage 1 application.

3. The Trip-boat:

The narrow and shallow section of canal between The Bridle Bridge (63) and Casthorpe Bridge (64) continues to cause some concern, especially with a fully loaded boat. 4. Workparties:

The workparty have been out on the Top Section of the canal, continuing to use Centauri to clear the branches and logs from the Canal. A lot of the smaller branches and logs flow with the water from Denton towards Woolsthorpe but get trapped in the shallow section near the Bridle Bridge which is an additional hazard for The Three Shires.

At BW's request we are going to make a few adjustments to the overspill weir at Denton and 'envelopes' on lock 18 at Woolsthorpe to raise the water level slightly. This action should allow us to navigate the shallow section a little easier.

6. Cotgrave Country Park Grantham Canal Improvements

Following a successful bid by Nottinghamshire County Council to Nottingham Growth Point for funding - a substantial amount of work is due to commence within Cotgrave Country Park and in particular on the length of the Grantham Canal within the park.

The funding bid was especially supported by the River Trent to Cotgrave Green Infrastructure study and the 6C's Green Infrastructure Strategy and was also enhanced by potential benefits to the adjacent development site on the former colliery.

The main benefit for the canal will be the removal of the large concrete colliery culvert bridge (bridge 14a) between Cotgrave Main Road Bridge and Hollygate Lane. This will potentially create the opportunity in the future to develop this length of canal for navigation providing a distance of approximately 1.7km (1.1 miles)

In addition the following works will be undertaken:

- A new bridge will be constructed immediately below Lock 7 on the abutments of the original access bridge. This new bridge will be designed to complement the lock, provide multi use recreational access and allow access for country park maintenance vehicles
- Redundant colliery services which were laid on the bed of the canal to the east of the colliery bridge (14a) will be removed.
- Towpath upgrade to accommodate increased recreational use within the country park.
- Habitat and balancing pond improvements within the country park.
- Improvements to footpaths and horse rides within the country park.
- Landscape / habitat enhancement, new hedgerows, existing pond improvements, grassland enhancement and woodland management.

The total estimated cost of the work is £381,000 with Nottinghamshire County Council providing £90,000 and the remainder being secured as Growth Point Green Infrastructure Grant.

Currently Nottinghamshire Country Council are undertaking engineering surveys and detailed design work. It is hoped that work will commence in late summer or early autumn and the work will be completed by January 2012.
