#### 6. Workparties

This months workparty dates are Thurs 23rd & Sat 25th, 9.00am at Woolsthorpe & for July, Thurs 28th & Sat 30th.



The workparty members have continued to remove branches and logs on the Top Section of the canal, using Centauri. Each time, we return with a boat load for burning. This is all material previously cut down and subsequently thrown into the canal. It's a lesson learnt for next year!

The crews of the of The Three Shires have reported a large underwater obstruction near Harlaxton which we think must be a submerged bough from the large tree that fell across the canal earlier in the year. Hopefully we can deal with that in the next couple of weeks.

Vandalism continues to be a escalating problem. More coping stones have been dislodged and pushed into the water at Longmoor Bridge (62) and some of the brickwork has suffered the same fate. There is now some doubt if the boats will pass under the Bridge unless we can retrieve, from under the water, some of the material from the parapets. There have been reports of 3 lads on bikes involved in this destruction. Possibly the same group have been happily removing 18 copings from the edges of the by-wash at lock 18. These are in the lock

approach. Both attacks will involve us in days and days of work to recover them, if we can, and replace them. The police have once again been involved. If anyone sees or indeed saw anything please contact Grantham Police on 0300 111 0300. Our contact is PC 637 Jessica Shipperbottom (01522 558 925)

Denton Slipway has also had some more unwelcome attention with a tree cut down and burnt, another stripped of it's bark and now that the low fence has been further destroyed, the grass picnic area is being used as a race track.
