### 7. Tony's Favourite Place

### My favourite place.

I'm not sure I should share this with you, but I have a long time habit of doing things against my better judgement, and this is probably another of them. You see, I have a favourite place along our wonderful Grantham Canal, but I have a conflict going on within. Whilst I so want to share this place with you, I want also, to keep it to myself. But it's no good, my sharing side has won. I can't help it. So, like a child with a secret, I'm just going to have to blurt it out!

In my, or should I now say, our, enchanting and magical place. I sit, so there is a seat, not a particularly comfortable seat....let us say, it's a good for your posture kind of a seat, but a seat nonetheless. It's also a seat with a view. A magnificent view of Belvoir Castle, seen at its best when lit by the late afternoon sun. The castle, from this viewpoint is framed between Hawthorns on the opposite bank, their blossom, now a distant memory. I've often wondered if the positioning of this seat was by chance, or by design. Which ever, it is perfectly placed.

It is mid July, and the bank side is a riot of colour. Shocking pink Willowherbs, each vying to out do the other to be the tallest. Broad sweeps of mauve, as Vetches, with tendrils, clinging in their tangled climb. A random splash of yellow, as its near cousin, stronger, but less prolific, strives for the attendance of a passing bee. So delicate is the scent of Meadowsweet, its fuzzy, out of focus flowers, now past their best, but still determined to add a little subtlety and give contrast to the canvas.

Speedy Swallows mop up unwary insects, and if you're lucky, the electric blue flash of a Kingfisher, or, sometimes perched, showing off the splendour of its orange breast. Is there a better sight in nature, I wonder?

This place is so quiet, that it is easy even, to be startled by the splash of a jumping fish. But soon, I hear the rumble of the lock gear, the clop of the horse, as she ascends the rise to the head of the lock, taking up the slack in the towing line as she goes. A girl, heaves the lockgate closed, and steps on to the back of the boat to join her mother. Bedecked with bonnets and with the fullness of their skirts, they look, in all but size, a mirror image of one another. Throughout the whole process, not a word is spoken. None was needed. They've done this same procedure many hundreds of times before.

The boatman, hobnail booted, and with a heavy, plodding gait, gives a little encouragement to the horse, and a quick, bird like nod of his head in my direction, in recognition of my presence. I reciprocate, as they pass on their way to the next lock in the flight.

You've guessed, I suspect, that the boat and its crew are all in my mind's eye. I observe them regularly at this spot, indeed I so look forward to seeing them, that I'm disappointed when they don't show up!

Those with some knowledge of this section of canal, will have roughly worked out where I'm idling my time away. The castle and the lock flight give it away. So, with almost satellite precision, I will tell you that I'm sitting on the, increasingly wobbly, seat above lock 13 on the Woolsthorpe flight.

Of course, in my imagination, it's always summer, and the sun always shines on my boating family. There are butterflies floating around their heads, and the air is filled with the scent of wildflowers. After all, we are the Romantic Canal! The reality, I know, was often different. Let's not go there!

Postscript: Sadly, between writing this, and sending it off, my seat is all but history. It's gone! Even a 'good for your posture' kind of a seat is better than no seat at all. Whether my seat is a victim of officialdom, who happened upon it, and noticed it had become a little infirm, or whether it has succumbed to the same lowlife who took it into their head to re-model the 'Stenwith Bottom Lock' sign, I don't know.

Anyone else got a favourite spot along the canal, and would like to share it with us? Now that I've lost mine.....I might come and 'muscle in' on yours!
