

## This month's update from Mike Stone (Chairman)

Have you noticed how you can go for several weeks with little or nothing happening and then suddenly everything hits you at once?

That's what has happened to the Society in recent weeks!

The maintenance team were working steadily on removing the leaks above Lock 17 and other members were undertaking planned tasks when BANG!

Some people were already very involved with the production of our new Canal Guide when CRT announced the sale of more equipment including a weed-boat; the Heritage lottery Fund committee decided to visit and inspect both CRT staff, GCS volunteers and the site of Locks 15 to 12; our friends in the military who offered to help us with moving a swing bridge at Bardney decided a reconnaissance visit was needed; Leicestershire highways Department came to see a couple of lowered bridges; there was a meeting re the development of a business strategy for the canal and a housing development alongside the canal started to be progressed.

A very big "THANK YOU" to all who have responded, at very short notice, to the weed boat appeal. The craft has so far cost GCS about £7,000 but it will be one of our most useful assets for both ourselves and our angling colleagues. By the time you read this it should be safely at Woolsthorpe where our engineering team can put it into first class order. In addition thanks are due to

Gundel Transport for their generous help with transport.

We hope the HLF team went home taking a positive view of the project to restore the locks; the military confirmed that they could undertake the work, with the help of a CRT crane barge, to remove the swing -bridge; Leicestershire's report on the bridges is still awaited; and the GCP, CRT and the society know where to go with a strategy document. The housing development is less positive as money promised to the society previously under S 106 payments appears to have been hi-jacked by Nottinghamshire CC for footpath developments! More work to do on this one!

Of course we had the Society AGM this month and we welcome Steve Swann, who has transformed our advertising and PR, to the committee.

Now a negative comment; at a recent meeting I attended it became obvious the society membership numbers – not active volunteers - are well below those of some other restoration societies. The GCS needs to address this problem as a matter of urgency as, I have been informed, grant funding bodies will consider the figure very carefully before awarding grants. Yes we knew that but what I did not know was that other societies have well into thousands of members. Action is required quickly to improve our membership numbers and I appeal to you all to help enrol neighbours, friends, people who are users of our towpath and those who wish to see a linear and very rural park in the Vale of Belvoir.

What of the new guide? It is completed and the copy has been sent to the publishers Harper Collins this week to meet our deadline. Thanks are due to Steve Swann and a few dedicated helpers who have sourced material and scoured the text for errors. I am sure you will like it and, more importantly, it will be bought by the public be they cyclists, walkers, fishermen, naturalists or even boaters who enjoy the Grantham Canal.

Will we all now get a period for rest and consolidation? I doubt it!

# Paul & Jan Dadford walk The Grantham ... Part 2

There were a few clouds, but the sun was shining through. The scenery along this part of the walk was stunning, with some beautiful plants, flowers and trees.

At around 11.30 we passed the halfway marker between Grantham and Nottingham and, knowing that there was still around 16 miles until the end of the walk, I wondered if we would ever be able to get to the end. Our pace had slowed a little and we were both feeling tired. We persevered and were rewarded at 1pm with a cold refreshing drink and a tasty baguette at the





Plough Inn in Hickling.

After an hour's rest with still no sign of the promised rain, we pressed on, praying that the weather would hold.

With about another 5 miles to go I was beginning to become worried about getting blisters on my feet as they were starting to get quite sore. We pressed on, still collecting the survey data and enjoying the peacefulness of the canal. With about a mile to go it was becoming painful to walk. After struggling on to Highbury House, our B&B for the night in Cropwell Bishop, it finally started to rain.

I was glad we had made it and it was great to be able to sit down and rest our weary feet. Paul discovered that he had got a small blister, but my feet appeared to be OK. After a couple of hours rest we needed to have some dinner, and the lady at the B&B recommend The Plough in

the next village, just a 10 minute walk away. Normally a 10 minute walk would be no problem, but after walking about 25miles in the last 2 days and with Paul's sore foot, it was a monumental task to get there. A very nice meal, a few glasses of wine and a relaxing evening were in store before heading back to the B&B to sleep soundly.

Bright and early on Saturday morning, after a wonderful full English breakfast, we were ready to start the last 9 miles of the walk. We were both feeling the pain of the day before, but were determined to finish. We were still in the dry section of the canal and it was lovely to arrive at





Joshuas Lock (Lock 8) to find water in the canal once more. Our pace was a lot slower than before, but with every mile post we passed we could begin to taste victory. The closer we got to Nottingham the slower we were walking, but we couldn't give up after having come so far and, at 12.35, almost 4 hours after leaving the B&B, we made it to the end at Trent Lock!

It had been a great 3 days with some beautiful scenery, unspoiled by the weather, and we had collected lots of useful data for the GCS as well as taking some lovely photos along the way. However, it wasn't quite over yet as we still had to get to the bus station in order to the get the bus back home to Oakham. With Paul's foot very sore and mine aching too, there was still another 2 miles to go, the longest 2 miles of the whole walk!

That night we celebrated our success at Greetham Valley with friends and family, and even with our aching limbs and sore feet we were still able to dance the night away!!
