

This month's update from Mike Stone (Chairman)

What a versatile team of volunteers there is in the GCS! The last month has demonstrated that members can turn their hands to almost any activity and deliver quality results.

Late in September our teams knocked down the fractured walls of Lock 15 and then spent the next week finishing the new by-wash followed by cleaning any bricks from the walls that could be reused.

Discovery Day was a success, not only due to the number of visitors attending – about 500 – but to the level of preparation by Tony J and an army of GCS members. The result was that the support from a wide range of stall-holders delivered a quality event – they all said could they come again? – and also put £1,800 into GCS coffers. Some days previously three volunteers had successfully completed a nine day training course permitting them to drive excavators and articulated dumper trucks. The trip-boat is still been chartered and delivering happy customers despite the crews wrestling with excessive growth of weed this summer. Away from the canal negotiations have continued with potential sponsors of materials; meetings have been held with CRT management to redraw the plans for rebuilding Lock 15 (and 14); discussions have taken place with landowners regarding access to locks and, new faces have appeared offering their services as active volunteers.

If you thought life was busy last year it certainly is hectic now! To all who offer their services as volunteers in whatever role I say a big '**Thank You!**' You are contributing to tomorrow's history today.

We enjoy (did I really say that?) a canal that was built over 200 years ago and I believe the work you are doing today will be enjoyed by people during the next 200 years.

“Stanton – Gone but not Forgotten” an illustrated talk by Stephen Flinders about the history of the Stanton iron works that used to be beside the Erewash canal.



The current 'state of play' is that before the by-wash can be used the concrete has to cure. It will then have the final brickwork completed before the canal can be dammed.

The lock walls are down and the area cleared ready for the foundations for the new walls to be dug. A huge amount of bricks are expected to be recovered but the task is slow thanks to the strong lime mortar used in the original construction.

Designs are presently being drawn up for the construction of the new walls. During the last few weeks 3 of our volunteers, John T, Bob T and Geoff G have been fully trained as 360 excavator drivers and, together with John R, have also passed their training on articulated dumpers.

The archaeologists had a bit of excitement when a 2ft 10in long cast iron 'bar' was found near the bottom of one wall. It was thought to be a section of 'Fish Belly Rail' dating from 1810. This type of rail was designed by William Jessop in 1789 for the mineral railway which passes close to this lock and subsequently built in 1883. However, after further examination, it was later decided that it could also be a section of 'fire step' dating from a similar period.

There were two guided walks carried out by members of the Canal & River Trust to Woolsthorpe Middle Lock with details about the project, funded by the Heritage Lottery Fund.

There were cakes & teas a plenty, a sumptuous barbecue and the lip smacking soup produced from the WW1 field kitchen little chance of going hungry!

But before the day was out there was the Duck Race, and what a Duck Race it was! With over 250 ambitious ducklings trying to outdo their neighbour and all being avidly cheered on by a huge crowd ... it was a veritable spectacle to behold! A huge achievement of our notable Duck Man, Ayup Meduck.
