THE WAY IT WAS

Following on from last month ...

The next problem was how to pump the water out after managing to get one pipe run working. We couldn't afford to hire or buy a large diaphragm pump but someone suggested a portable fire pump. So we purchased a 250gallon per minute twin hose Coventry Climax and Dave Carnell helped with fittings and hoses. When up and running this would pump out the lock chamber and short pound in about half a day.

The first time we saw it empty revealed many hidden items. The remains of the top gates, several large coping stones and many tons of building waste tipped in by small lorries from the towpath. During some of the clearance days we found many period items possibly cast aside by boat crews.

The problem we now found was that the chamber and pound would refill with water over several days and the time taken to pump out took too much time out of the working day also the pump was only suitable for clean water so a small diaphragm pump was purchased to lift sludge, etc.

The reason it all refilled was water leaking through the old sluice in the concrete weir and a small stream running down from the higher woodland's . We tried many methods to try to seal or divert these but none were successful.

An idea came to mind to build a coffer dam across the tail of the lock similar to the one used on the Canal Museum job in Nottingham. The reason being to reduce the amount of water pumped out each time we began. We had some scaffold poles, fittings and boards so we built an 'A' frame to support

the boards and covered it with sheeting and it was reasonably successful until someone kept vandalising it. With the help of the local fishing club the problem was resolved.

We knew that in the long term none of the above would be successful. Someone found a company trying to get rid of many tons of clay so, for the transport costs, we had several lorry loads delivered and stored on the old railway track. The field down to the lock side was too wet for heavy lorries so we brought the clay down using dumpers and even these cut up the field, John Moulcher was not happy!

We hired a tracked excavator and this quickly built a clay dam above the lock chamber and another one after the tail of the lock. This cured all the leakage problems and set the precedence for all future lock restorations.

What a learning curve, when you think of the wasted man hours etc!

We then had to remove all the other systems we had tried together with running a new pipe on the off bank side well back from the lock side. Because it was higher than the water level it had to be siphoned using a Y branch with removable caps to pre fill the pipe. This all worked reasonably well and the next job was to clear the chamber of all that rubble.

More next time.

Flora & Fauna along the Grantham Canal by James Faulconbridge

November – Hedgerow Banquets

A walk along the canal towpath in November is likely to be preceded by flurries of wings flitting ahead of you down the hedgerows. Autumn berries are a banquet for birds, allowing them to fatten up and maximise their chances of surviving the winter and hedgerows provide them in abundance.

Hedgerows are an intrinsic component of the countryside but not a natural one. They are planted features, used to demarcate boundaries such as parish boundaries or fields, and thus are often the oldest components in a planned countryside landscape such as that through which the Canal runs.

Their composition locally is often dominated by hawthorn with their familiar deep-red haws, but other berry-bearing species include blackthorn with its deep purple sloes; buckthorn with its small black elderberry-like bundles; dogrose with those swaying red rosehips; and bramble with its familiar blackberries. Ivy too produces berries – less appealing to human tastes but a nutritious source of food for birds, especially after the juicier fruits have been taken.

Mixed tit flocks are a common sight – you'll hear the 'chik chik' of long-tailed tits as they keep in contact with one another and they're joined by blue tits, great tits and coal tits. You might also spot the white rump of a bullfinch shooting ahead of you, not to mention the familiar chaffinches. Such is the bounty of these food sources that birds fly from colder climes to take advantage of them – soon fieldfares and redwings will join the year-round residents.





RANGERS REPORT

We have had a case of fly tipping in the car park at Fosse Bridge in October.

About 20 fridges and fridge/freezers had been dumped overnight on Friday the 27th.



These have now been removed by Canal and River Trust.

The Rangers Team are just starting a programme of training covering safety, defect reporting and lone working procedures.

The next Rangers meeting will be held at The Plough, Stathern, on Monday 13th November 2017.

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
